Houses and Barns in Dentdale, by Arnold Pacey

Saturday 1 June

A choice of 2 walks in Dentdale (where the NYCVBSG did fieldwork in the 1970s when Dent was still in Yorkshire!). Some quite unusual, though modest, buildings will be seen.

Short walk (2 miles): Dent Village and its South Eastern Margin Meet at village car park (map ref SD 704871) at 12.30pm for pub lunch and tour. The walk will cross fields so bring suitable footwear.

Long walk (9 miles): Dent Village and the Middle Dale

Meet at Lea Yeat (map ref SD 761869) at 10.45am. Lea Yeat is at the foot of a very steep road leading to Dent station, and the walk is planned so that members may use the train from Leeds which is due at Dent at 10.11am. You can catch the train at the following stations:





New Publications

Mediaeval London Houses, by John Schofield, published by Yale University Press at £40.00, is based on the author's research for his PhD. A glowing review in Construction History 1995 comments that the book covers a wider field than suggested by the title. In particular there are references to building materials and techniques, and their spread to other areas.

Timber Marks

An article in the recent IFA Buildings Interest Group Newsletter requests information on unusual markings on pine. If you see long sets of numbers, letters and symbols, they are probably quality marks made in the Baltic ports before the timber was shipped. Sometimes they are only partially visible, as the timber has been sawn after marking. On Sunday 12 May, over 300 windmills and watermills throughout Britain will open to the public, some opening for just that day, 45 mills are in working order and will be in action on the day, wind permitting.





The turn of the century saw the abandonment of many mills. The few survivors are still being lost at an alarming rate, despite being a vital part of our industrial past. The Wind and Watermill Section of the Society of the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB) is the only national body solely concerned
