Ryedale buildings group now online

The Ryedale Vernacular Building Materials Research Group, with whom we jointly organised the annual recording conference in May, has a new website at www.ryedale-buildings.org.uk.

The group was formed in 2002 as a multi-disciplinary research group to bring together interested groups, societies, institutions and individuals who have an interest in the vernacular buildings of Ryedale, North Yorkshire, and in particular the building stones and source quarries. The group normally holds three field meetings each year, and the reports of these will be made available on the website. Previous meetings have included visits to Leavening and Acklam villages, Sheriff Hutton Castle, Hildenley Quarry, Slingsby village and Settrington House and village. The site will be developed over the coming months - don't forget to keep an eye on it!

Milestones in Kirklees

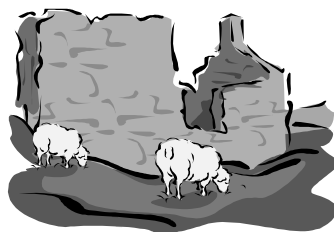

Some recent publications

Bedern Hall by Richard Hall. May 2004. 40 pages, ISBN 1874454310, £3.95. York Archaeological Trust has produced in collaboration with Bedern Hall Company Ltd the first in a series of booklets on some of York's lesser known buildings and areas. It covers the history of the Bedern area, the Vicars Choral and their College, and the construction of this splendid medieval hall.

Clay and Cob Buildings by John McCann. New colour edition of Shire Album 105, £4.99. Describes the various processes of building with earth, examines regional patterns and illustrates standing buildings of clay and cob in many parts of Britain.

Understanding Small Period Houses by Amanda Laws. Crowood Press, November 2003, ISBN 1861266006, £25. This book uses examples of building types and styles drawn from across England to investigate the structure and detailing of small period houses.



Archaeology and Historic Landscapes of the Yorkshire Dales, edited by R F White and P R Wilson. Yorkshire Archaeological Society Occasional Paper No 2, 2004. £20 + £5 p&p, available from YAS, telephone 0113 2457910, website www.yas.org.uk. A collection of 21 papers, including 'Kilnsey Old Hall' by P F Ryder, 'Field Barns in Swaledale and Arkengarthdale' by Robert White and Graham Darlington, and 'The Hogg Houses of Upper Swaledale' by Adam Menuge and Jennifer Deadman. Other articles cover lead mining, dry stone walls, woodlands and rabbit warrens. We hope to bring you a review of this book in a future Newsheet or Journal.

Richmond at the Start of the 21st Century: An Architectural History by Mark Whyman. Paperback, 320 pages, ISBN 0954578902, published November 2003 by Bargate Publications, 40 Bargate, Richmond, North Yorkshire DL10 4QY, telephone 01748 821534. This book is an attempt to take a snapshot of the town's buildings at a moment in time – the start of the 21st century. It seeks to describe in words and pictures every street within the town boundary, with at least one photograph of each street and some of the more interesting buildings. It covers not only the historic buildings in the town but even modest suburban developments that have taken place up to 2003.

Echoes of Ripon's Past, edited by Mike Younge. 220 pages, ISBN 0954707702, £10, published May 2004 by Ripon Local Studies Research Centre, telephone 01765 692200. Over a hundred illustrated articles about Ripon and its history.

Traditional skills prove popular

As part of National Park Week, the North York Moors National Park recently held its first traditional building skills workshop on the use of lime in historic buildings. The day was a great success, with 29 people attending the course. Delegates ranged from local contractors who wanted to expand their skills and broaden their markets to 'Do-It-Yourself' owners of historic buildings. The workshop aimed to promote the use of lime mortar (rather than cement) on historic buildings. The event was held in conjunction with the National Trust who hosted the workshop at their Grade II listed watermill in Bransdale.
