Dendrochronology update

On 25 May 2007 several members of the Dendrochronology Working Group accompanied Cathy Tyers of Sheffield University on a visit to three cruck houses: Glebe Farm, Octon; Spout House, Bilsdale; and Delves Cottage, Egton. The suitability of the buildings for dendro-dating was assessed: most of the timbers associated with the cruck trusses are likely to be of oak but some have a better potential for dating than others. We are now considering the question of funding for the dating of at least two of the buildings.

Despite the adverse weather conditions (somewhat wet!) we saw some fascinating buildings and were invited to record some of them at a later date – watch this space for details.

Cowside – in need of help

The Landmark Trust recently launched an appeal to raise £600,000 to restore Cowside, a neglected farmstead in Upper Wharfedale. Cowside stands on a grassy shelf on a steep gritstone hillside facing south onto the fell which once provided summer grazing to cattle from Fountains Abbey. In 1682, Jane and Frances Slinger farmed there. Building archaeology suggests that the house dates from around this time, though it includes fragments re-used from an earlier building. The house has a hall (containing a fine inglenook fireplace) and parlour with chambers above, and an unusual two storey service wing of dairy, wash house and storage rooms, and two cowsheds, a detached pigsty and privy.

The House Archive

www.TheHouseArchive.com.

This recently-launched house history website hopes to eventually build into a resource of information on the history of the UK's houses and their neighbourhoods. Using the latest wiki technology, anyone can contribute pictures and text and so share the results of their own research, including projects organised by local history societies and individual householders sharing what they know about the history of the houses they live in. Contributors can create pages on the website for their neighbourhood, street or house and link them to similar pages. If you are missing information in a research project, you can create a page to tell the world what you know and ask for anyone who has information to add it to the page.

Wentworth Castle and Gardens

Wentworth Castle Gardens at Stainborough, near Barnsley, featured on the BBC TV series *Restoration* and opened fully to the public for the first time in May. The parkland includes twenty-six listed buildings and monuments, which are being restored in a major Heritage Lottery Fund project. Guided tours of Wentworth Castle itself, home to the Northern College for Residential Adult Education, are normally available in summer but have now finished for 2007. A visitor centre café has been created in the restored Long Barn. The barn dates from 1715 and is the earliest building within the Home Farm complex, which comprises a collection of 18th and 19th century stone farm buildings designed to serve the needs of Wentworth Castle. The roof structure is reported to be a re-used medieval timber construction of unknown origin. Gardens are open daily from 10am to 5pm until September, and then 10am to 4pm October to March.
