
Brick and Tile in Yorkshire's Vernacular Buildings



Some recent publications

Langton House and the Carlen Brewery: A History 1751-2004 by Jennifer Deadman. Published by Great Ayton Community Archaeology Project 2004. Available at £5.50 (including p&p) from Cath Small, The Chapel Flat, 4a High Street, Great Ayton, Middlesbrough TS9 6NJ. Langton House was recognised as one of the older buildings in Great Ayton. Some sketchy details of its history and that of the surrounding buildings were known, but nothing of their design and construction nor the evolution of the site which for a greater part of its life had been home to a thriving nineteenth century brewery. The Great Ayton Community Archaeology Group, led by Jen Deadman, investigated and recorded some of the buildings on the site, with analysis and interpretation by Jen Deadman and Cath Small. The gable of the building features an interesting finial stone, which seems to have been a medieval or sub-medieval carved stone, recut in the late eighteenth century with a carving of a serpent on one face.

Period House Fixtures and Fittings 1300-1900 by Linda Hall. November 2005, 224pp, ISBN 1853067423, £12.99. Published by Countryside Books, telephone 01635 43816, website www.countrysidebooks.co.uk. This definitive reference book charts the development of the fixtures and fittings we can see today – from medieval and Tudor times to Georgian and Victorian. Each component has its own chapter – doors, windows, stairs, screens and panelling, ceilings and fireplaces. Photographs and line drawings make recognition easier and there is even space to cover regional variations.

Pastoral Peculiars: Curiosities in the Countryside by Peter Ashley. Paperback, 126 pages, October 2005, English Heritage Publications, ISBN 1850749604, £14.99. They could be off-beat water towers, singular obelisks or jackdawed hilltop follies. *Pastoral Peculiars* puts us into metaphorical wellington boots, taking us out into the fields and scurrying along the hedgerows to dig out the curious and to tell us the stories that placed them there.

Within the Pale by the Sheriff Hutton Women's Institute Community Pale Project, edited by Ed Dennison. Available from Ed Dennison, 18 Springdale Way, Beverley, East Riding of Yorkshire HU17 8NU, £15 + £5 p&p (cheques payable to Sheriff Hutton WI Pale Project). Sheriff Hutton park lies north-east of York, to the south of the village and its two castles. This book traces the fascinating story of the medieval deer park, from its creation right through to the present day, and includes chapters on the castles, the architectural history of Sheriff Hutton Hall, and the farms in the park.

The Forgotten Landscapes of the Yorkshire Wolds by Chris Fenton-Thomas. Paperback, 176 pages, July 2005, Tempus Publishing Ltd, ISBN 0752433466, £14.99. This long-term study of landscape change on the Wolds uses archaeological and historical sources to look at land division, territorial organisation and settlement patterns from the late prehistoric period to the middle ages.

West Yorkshire Archaeology Advisory Services Newsletter. Available online at www.arch.wyjs.org.uk (under 'Publications'). The Autumn 2005 edition includes a short article on two timber-framed medieval buildings called 'The Brewhouse' and 'The Refectory', dendro-dated to 1481 and 1509/10, which lie within the precincts of the 18th century Home Farm at Nostell Priory.

Directory of Craftsmen and Conservation Specialists published 2005 by the York Consortium for Conservation and Craftsmanship. An updated directory containing details of specialists based in the Greater York area, including experts in architectural joinery, handmade bricks, stone masonry and carving, and many others. Recording farm buildings around East Leeds

At the West Yorkshire Archaeology Dayschool held in Leeds in November, two local societies based in East Leeds reported on their activities:

Leeds Archaeology Fieldwork Society

LAFS was set up in spring 2005 with the aim of undertaking archaeological fieldwork in and around East and North Leeds and wherever possible working with local communities and schools. The society has recently been awarded an Awards For All grant of £3000 to enable them to undertake a survey of historic farms and barns in East Leeds. The aim of the one-year project is to survey and record eight farms, to produce a photographic and drawn record, to undertake a short desktop assessment and to interview farmers and record oral histories. The reports will be deposited with owners, in local libraries and the SMR. Farms of various status in Colton, Newsam Green, Gamblethorpe, Lazencroft and Shippen have been selected for the project, and the buildings to be surveyed include stables, byres, threshing barns, dovecotes and coach sheds. It is hoped to establish a chronology of construction and functions that have altered over time and to determine whether some buildings have medieval or Tudor elements.
