

Publications

Addingham Houses 1750-1850: built in a time of village expansion by Arnold Pacey. October 2014, ISBN 1502791269. Available from Amazon: paperback 58 pages £3.50, or Kindle edition £1.99. Before 1750 Addingham was a small farming community but during the next 100 years (the period covered by this book) the village was transformed by the coming of the textile industry and the construction of substantial mills and related enterprises. This expansion produced wealthy mill owners who needed suitable housing for themselves and their families and also lesser properties for their workers. In the first part of this book, Arnold writes about the principal property owners and describes the houses that they built, with photographs and detailed pen and ink drawings. The second part is devoted to the builders, stonemasons and other craftsmen who built the houses and their distinctive working methods.

Budding authors and other organisations may be interested to know that Arnold's book was published through CreateSpace, a self-publishing service owned by Amazon (<https://www.createspace.com/>) which is designed to allow authors and societies to self-publish on a small scale and at very low cost. Books are produced on a 'print on demand' basis, so there is no need to order a large print run.

York: An Artist's View, an architectural guide by Hubert Pragnell. The author's watercolours illustrate an architectural walk through York. Paperback, around £20.

The Town of Stockton on Tees and its Buildings by Robin Daniels, Tees Archaeology, 2014. In 2009 Tees Archaeology began to work with local volunteers to create a 'snapshot in time' of the buildings in the historic town centre, resulting in this booklet which can be downloaded free of charge from www.teesarchaeology.com, or printed copies can be obtained for free from all Stockton Borough libraries or the Rediscover Stockton shop.

Beverley exhibitions. Beverley Guildhall produces inexpensive A4 format publications containing the text of all previous exhibitions held there. These offer interesting historical information on Beverley and are available from the Guildhall, or you can download them in electronic format from www.museums.eastriding.gov.uk/beverley-guildhall/past-exhibitions-online.

'Baltic' timber markings in Yorkshire

I am researching 'Baltic' timber marks in eighteenth/nineteenth century buildings in Yorkshire for a master's dissertation (expanding beyond the county in the future). I have obtained examples from HER offices and some archaeology units, but this does not cover all sources so any examples people could contribute will really help my studies.

Basic information needed includes:



- National grid reference/address
- Type of building
- Type of mark (race-knife/painted/chiselled)
- Date of construction/repair/extension
- Timber the mark/s are present on (e.g. tie-beam/purlin)
- Photographs (or sketch/description)

but any photographs with an address if no other information is available will be useful. Examples will be gratefully received.

Researching king post roofs

In the May Newsheet, J T Smith suggested that the YVBSG should consider initiating a research project on king post roofs. Resources are limited until we complete the Beverley project, but nevertheless we're now making a tentative start by gathering together some data.



King posts are present in a wide range of buildings in the Pennine uplands from parish churches to timber-framed

aisled structures to field barns and village barns. In date they range from the fifteenth century in local oak to nineteenth century bolted trusses of 'Baltic' timber imported on canals. The origin of king posts, however, is unclear and the study hopes to address this. There are related upper king post trusses and king block trusses when a full king post may have restricted use of the roof space. We have examples of former crown post roofs (even in the Pennines) which were cut down and the former crown post re-used as a later king post. We have recorded quite a lot of king posts in Craven and the Yorkshire Dales and upper Calderdale.

There are two ways in which members can help with this study. Firstly, by providing examples of king post (or king strut) roofs in Yorkshire; please send as many details as possible, with illustrations if possible as verbal or written information is difficult to interpret without a picture. Secondly, by joining a small working group to gather the information together (this could include searching our 1800 building reports for records of king post roofs).
