#### Features, Fixtures and Fittings of Vernacular Buildings

Saturday 15 March

For the final session you are invited to bring photos/slides/drawings of interesting features, fixtures or fittings. We hope to discuss their use in dating a building, and hope to use the information subsequently to produce a booklet on Yorkshire


### **Publications**
