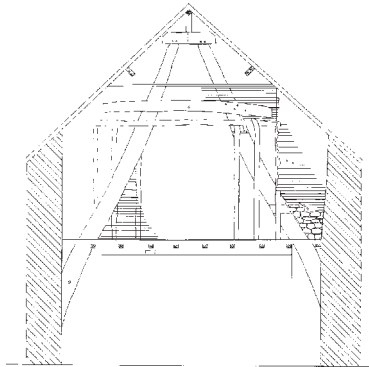
YVBSG Events For Your Diary

Observing Crucks in North-East Yorkshire

Sunday 21 June 2009

Following the day school on crucks in May, we will spend a day observing some crucks in situ, led by Barry Harrison. The programme is expected to be as follows:

- Assemble in car park at Hutton-le-Hole at 10am.
- Visit to cruck buildings at Ryedale Folk Museum, 10.20-11.30am.
- Reassemble at Thornton Dale car park at 12.00 followed by lunch break (cafes, pubs etc).
- Visit cruck houses in Maltongate, Thornton Dale, 1.15-2.15pm.
- Reassemble at Cropton (parking on street) followed by visits to cruck houses in the main street, 2.40-3.45pm.
- Reassemble at Pockley (parking on street) at 4.15pm for short walkabout viewing cruck-built longhouses (exteriors), 4.45-5.15pm.



Note there are charges for car parks at Hutton-le-Hole and Thornton Dale and for entrance to Ryedale Museum.

Visit to Low Hall, Dacre, and Roundabout Farm, Thornthwaite-with-Padside

Saturday 27 June 2009

A visit to two buildings in Nidderdale, organised by Kevin Illingworth. Meet at Low Hall at 11am. Low Hall is situated four miles south-east of Pateley Bridge, just (east) off the B6451, between Dacre and Dacre Banks. Watch out for the Low Hall sign at the entrance to their private road, also with Dacre Aberdeen Angus on it. And there's a small clump of Scots Pine trees as a landmark. Drive down this lane (don't go to Aberdeen!).

Low Hall has a fine three-gabled south front with a very attractive garden. Dated 1635, it was much altered internally in the 1920s and later twentieth century. Ogee-headed garden gateway. Mrs Halliday will not be around during our visit, but has kindly arranged for us to see some ground floor rooms, including one where a stone roller, once pulled by horses, is now erected vertically, supporting a ceiling. Surveyed by NYCVBSG in 1978. Cost £2 per head, all for charity, perhaps a little more if a cup of tea is provided.

At lunchtime, snacks and meals are available at the nearby Royal Oak, Dacre Banks. Dated 1752, it also has a large corbelled fireplace uncovered in 1999.

In the afternoon at 2pm we will visit Roundabout Farm (courtesy of Dr Bahaa Seedhom), which is located three miles to the south-west, just north of the Stone House Inn. Features are as in Newsheet 54 (November 2008). Also plank and muntin partition. The bressumer beam is low, so if you are tall perhaps you should bring a first-aid kit, or 'leave thi yed at wom'! Dr Seedhom will provide some refreshments. A drystone wall encloses Bahaa's garden, so you won't see a ha-ha, but you might see some Sedum among the rocks ...

East Keswick Day

An enjoyable day introducing the local history group at East Keswick to the study of vernacular buildings was held on 26 April 2009. In the morning there was an introductory lecture from Alison Armstrong, followed by a brief history of the village and its buildings from Margaret Moseley from East Keswick, and a short presentation by Steve Basset on his renovation of a small building in the village. During lunch at the village hall the forty-five participants could inspect the excellent displays produced by the local group, our own travelling display, and admire Bob Greaves' models of timber trusses and joints. In the afternoon there was a guided walk, detailed building observation and practical methods of recording, the last two using an L-shaped barn organised by the East Keswick group. We hope to follow this up with further recording. Many thanks to everyone involved in this successful collaboration.

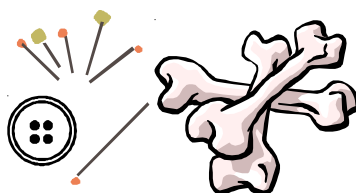

Where is ... the largest flagstone in northern England?

We're talking surface area, and Derbyshire can be included.

Is it the pavement in front of a Hall,
or the roof of a Calderdale coal-hole?

Waterhouse was around, and in the same street,
or does water flow under it, beneath your feet?

Is it a vertically-set flagstone, as seen in, eg, Water,
a Rossendale village; and Northowram, near Halifax?
This could be a fence or a village pound,
but how much of this will be below ground?

Will it be a Yellow Flag (*Iris Pseudocorus*)?
If you measure this you'll be wasting your Thyme,
because they only grow to around three feet nine.

Is it a blue flag? Eg, Horton Flags.
Or more than one? Blue Flax (*Linum Anglicum*)
Flax are lovers of lime, flags can be laid on lime.*

Is it the National Flag of England?
No, because flags flutter, flagstones don't, but can be rippled.
But just one of these flags looks down at what might be the contender(s),
and there's a clue in the emblem as to the name of the building.

**One word in this sentence is the name of a street where an enormous flag(s) is bedded down.*

I would be grateful to receive information on very large flags. Some answers will appear in a future Newsheet, including revealing how one town has claimed the largest flagstone for at least thirty years, yet thirty seconds with a tape measure was enough to dispel this claim!

New tours of York buildings

Bedern Glaziers' Studio

Bedern Glaziers' Studio in York, built in the thirteenth century as the chapel of the College of Vicars Choral, opened in 2009 as a public showcase for the conservation of stained glass, and particularly the glass of the Minster's Great East Window. Members of the public can go behind the scenes to watch the work of York Glaziers' Trust conservators. Tours of Bedern Glaziers' Studio take place at 2pm on Wednesdays and Fridays leaving from the Group Desk in the Minster. Tours last for approximately 1 hour and cost £5 per person.

'Hidden Minster' and Stoneyard Tours

The Minster also intends to introduce some new tours designed to reveal areas of the cathedral which have been off-limits previously.

Specialist guides are being trained to lead three 'Hidden Minster' trips, which will take in the Chapter House roof and Mason's Loft, the West End and Bell Towers, and the Crypt passages and Five Sisters Walkway.

Tours of the Minster Stoneyard and East Front scaffolding will also be offered. These two-hour tours take place in the stoneyard itself, with ventures into the masons' and carvers' workshops, before heading up the hoist into the scaffolding on the East Front to see the conservation work up close.

Historic Houses Association

Membership of the Friends of the HHA gives free access to almost 300 historic houses. Single membership costs £37. In addition, there are 13 regional 'Friends' groups. Their representatives organise tours to properties, some of which are not normally open to the public. There is a charge for these tours. If you know a Friend, you can join these tours as a guest. Among the houses of all periods being visited this year, the following might appeal to those interested in vernacular buildings.

- Toad Hall, near Holmes Chapel, Cheshire (timber-framed, mid 16th century) and Medicine House, which was moved 17 miles and re-erected next to Toad Hall (timber-framed, early 16th century) – Wednesday 8 July 2009
- Hellifield Peel, near Skipton (c.1440) – Sunday 26 July 2009

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
