Visit to Birthwaite Hall and other buildings in the Barnsley area

Saturday 26 June 2010

A day in South Yorkshire organised by Kevin Illingworth. We hope to visit the following buildings (travelling by car):

- West Wing, Birthwaite Hall, Darton (courtesy of Peter Thornborrow). The west wing of a large seventeenth century H-plan house has two storeys with attics and cellars. Followed by morning coffee/tea.
- Birthwaite Hall Farm (courtesy of the Crossley family). A range of decorated seventeenth century two- and three-storeyed farm buildings. The photo on the right shows a doorhead on the farm buildings.
- Mill of the Black Monks, Grange Lane (A633), Cundy Cross, opposite Monk Bretton Priory. We will have lunch at this publichouse/restaurant. Formerly a water-powered mill of 1635 (with earlier origins), it was raised six feet by hydraulic jacks in 1989-90. Many features of interest including spiral dripmould stops, 'goblet' chamfer stops (find them!), and early incised graffiti. The Mill, expected to re-open May/June, was visited by Peter Thornborrow's WEA members in the early 1990s, and by the YVBSG in 1999.
- New Hall Farm, Doncaster Road (off), A635, Ardsley. Visit to an early sixteenth century five-bay cruck-framed barn. Retains three cruck trusses (originally five). This barn will soon be converted into an educational centre for schoolchildren, and if the builders arrive before 26 June and erect scaffolding, the owner, Helen Rhodes, has suggested that we visit the barn at a later date.

Meet at Birthwaite Hall at 10.30am. The house is on the east side of the A637, about 1½ miles south of junction 38 of the M1 motorway and about 4 miles north-west of Barnsley. A landmark will be an LWB Landrover (colour: blue and limestone) at the entrance to the drive.

HLF decides not to fund Timber Framed Buildings Project

In a letter dated 21 April the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) rejected the YVBSG application for a 'Your Heritage' grant to cover costs of the YVBSG-led *Timber Framed Buildings in the Historic East Riding and City of Hull* project. This was a surprise because the project team had thought that the application was a good one with a good chance of being accepted.

The reasons for the rejection appear, from the letter, to be significant. So, I have asked the project team and the YVBSG committee to send comments and proposals to me and then we will review our options for going forward. These are likely to include re-application to HLF, or to look for other sources of funding.

I would like to thank the project team and all those others, including our supporting organisations, who have been involved to date. Although application for an HLF grant was key in the formative project plan, this setback, in my opinion, does not put an end to the whole process and objective.

Timber-Framed Buildings in the Thirsk Area

Sunday 4 July 2010

An excursion to look at buildings with Barry Harrison. The proposed outline for the day is as follows:

Conference Review Day

Sunday 19 September 2010

A day to review the buildings recorded at the annual conference in Beverley in May. Details to follow.

Recent YVBSG events ...

Walkabout around the Howcans Potteries, near Halifax



This was kindly led by Stuart Crowther on Sunday 25 April 2010. We started by looking at the site of an excavation of the site of a pottery kiln at Pule Hill (SE092 272) dated to c1650. Pule Hill was the site of the first Halliday family potteries. Thereafter our walk took us past the second site at Bate Ain (SE 085 282) shortly preceded (on the walk north along Howcans Lane) by the third (SE 085 279). We saw evidence for clay mines in the hillside, part of the iron rail of a trackway, and spoil heaps at Bate Ain where there were fragments of saggars (clay vessels covering and protecting the pots in the kiln) and pot shards. In the nineteenth century the family moved into brick and tile manufacture. Howcans House, built by the family, is a semi-detached residence facing west with its back to the lane. The front has coloured and patterned brickwork walling, no doubt showing off their products. The walk concluded with a look at Brow Pit (SE 089 284, pictured above), the site of one of many former coal mines in the area, and said to be at the start of the Great Yorkshire Coalfield. A wide semi-circular stone wall was seen around a sunken circular depression at the top of the shaft. This is the site of a horse gin wheel, used to draw up and lower items down the shaft. Our thanks go to Stuart for leading this walkabout.

Spout House, Bilsdale

Until 3 October 2010

This thatched cruck-framed house of about 1550 is now open to the public for the summer, daily 10am to 4pm except Thursday. Originally a farmworker's cottage, in 1714 it became an alehouse, the Sun Inn, and remained so until 1914 (the new inn stands across the yard). It was renovated by the National Park Authority in 1982 using traditional materials and methods. Admission free. Eight miles north of Helmsley on the east side of the B1257. Well worth a visit.

Steeply pitched roof, formerly thatched. Three-unit plan. Housepart is normally reserved for bed and breakfast guests, but we will have access to this, where the spere and part of the bressummer survives. Corbelled chimney stack outside.
