## YVBSG Events For Your Diary

### The Borough of Knaresborough and its Early Buildings (15th-17th centuries)

Sunday 19 June 2011

A walk with Barry Harrison around this small but complex town which boasts at least thirty timber-framed buildings, twenty of which were recorded by YVBSG in the late 1970s. Most of these houses are commercial premises geared to the tourist trade. They are likely to be very busy on a summer Sunday and internal visits cannot therefore be guaranteed. No doubt some quick 'pop-ins' can be negotiated on the day. The programme is as follows:

- 9.45-10.00 Assembly by Market Cross (pedestrian precinct) in Market Place
- 10.00-12.00 Perambulation of Market Place area (Market Place, Castlegate, Cheapside)
- 12.00-1.15 Lunch (plenty of pubs, cafes etc)
- 1.15-3.30 Perambulation of north end of town: High Street, Bond End (*photo right*), Waterside and Kirkgate
- 3.30-4.00 Short tea-break
- 4.00-5.15 Perambulation of south end of town: York Place, Gracious Street, Briggate

Please note that the second walk (north end) involves a steep climb from Waterside to the town centre.



Pay-parking available to south of Market Place (Chapel Street and Castlegate) and just off the A59 on the north side of York Place. Further parking on Waterside.

### Visit to Bashall Hall and Browsholme Hall, Forest of Bowland, near Clitheroe

Saturday 16 July 2011

A full-day visit to two sites both in the historic West Riding of Yorkshire, organised by Kevin Illingworth.

In the morning we walk 250 yards from Bashall Barn Food Visitor Centre car park to Bashall Hall and farm buildings (a private site, courtesy of David Barnes).

We visit a long stone building, c1600, with jettied timber-framed upper storey and jettied timber gallery on south side, originally barracks/lodgings for private army. Stables below. Altered but listed grade II\*. Interior access. A rare and unusual building (*photo overleaf*).



Bashall Hall

Bashall Hall is early 17th century, stone built, partly Georgianised, listed grade II\* (*photo left*). Both facades have four gables. Three storeys with attics. External viewing of an uncommonly interesting house, rarely seen.

Also an early 18th century barn (grade II) and an early 18th century summer house (grade II\*).

Approximately 12 noon: lunch at Bashall Barn Food Visitor Centre. This is another barn (unlisted) with restaurant, farm shop, micro-brewery and antiques loft (courtesy of Simon Barnes). We hope most members will eat here, for obvious reasons!

## Bashall and Browsholme (continued ...)

In the afternoon we move on to Browsholme (pronounced Brewsum) Hall, three miles to the north-west, website [www.browsholme.co.uk](http://www.browsholme.co.uk). Grade I listed. Large early 17th century, H-plan house of three storeys. Red sandstone. We will have access to the rear, not normally seen by visitors. After the standard interior guided tour we will see the re-used Celtic head and gadroon decorative stones only known so far at Higher Halsteads, Slaidburn area. Visit includes a half-mile walk, past the lake, to South Lodge (1806) where more reset decorative stonework can be seen. Two more barns in the farmyard can be viewed, as well as a ha-ha.

Meet 10.30am at Bashall Barn Food Visitor Centre car park (two and a half miles west of Clitheroe). From Clitheroe take the B6243 road to Longridge then over the River Ribble, then turn right after Edisford Bridge Inn, following the brown signs for the visitor centre ([www.bashallbarn.co.uk](http://www.bashallbarn.co.uk)).

Group visit price for Browsholme Hall is £5.50. If you'd like to come, please telephone Kevin Illingworth on 01422 844941 leaving your name, telephone number (slowly), and state if you don't want lunch. 25 people will be sufficient. If we have time we can visit Little Mitton Hall Restaurant for end-of-day drinks. This is a 19th century house but with a large open timber-framed hall of c1500.

## Hazel Voakes

We are sorry to report that former YVBSG member Hazel Voakes died on 9 March 2011, aged 79 years. Hazel was trained as a nurse but had to leave the profession due to health problems. She returned to her parents' home, Crag Hill Farm, Killinghall, where she took an active part in running the farm. Hazel was responsible for managing a sizeable flock of sheep – literally as a shepherdess – where her nursing skills in gynaecology proved a great asset. She also joined the Nidderdale History Research Group that had been established by Bernard Jennings following the publication of *A History of Nidderdale* in 1967. One of the research themes in which that group were interested was the vernacular architecture of the area and I was invited to meet them in late 1973. A number of the members, led by Hazel and Mary Barley, agreed to join our Group (then the North Yorkshire and Cleveland Vernacular Buildings Study Group) as one of the local sections that we had in

those days. With all Hazel's farming contacts we had ready access to farmhouses all over the Dale and beyond. Most early meetings were for extensive surveys by the Brunskill method, but detailed recording got underway in 1975, the year in which Hazel was elected Treasurer of NYC VBSG, a post she held for the next ten years. Between 1976 and 1979 over one hundred buildings were recorded in Nidderdale and the Washburn Valley. During much of this period Hazel, Mary Barley and myself met for all-day recording sessions once a fortnight, summer and winter, far outpacing any other local section. Most of the plans were made by Hazel who had a special aptitude for drawing. She was also elected to the national Vernacular Architecture Group and regularly attended their Winter and Spring meetings. Over the next three years various circumstances prevented the three of us from meeting on a regular basis, but Hazel and Mary forged ahead

with documentary research and with writing a new chapter on Housing for the second edition of the *History of Nidderdale*. Following the death of her father, Hazel and her mother moved to Boroughbridge. Hazel resigned as Treasurer in 1985 but remained a member of our Group for many years. As a full-time carer, she could not carry on as an active recorder and devoted her energies to her other great enthusiasm – silk weaving – at which she was highly skilled.

With her bubbling personality, raw Yorkshire humour and understanding of farming and the farming community she charmed her way into many a house. After our President, Barbara Hutton, she was the greatest and most prolific recorder in the early years of the Group. Her contribution was immense and did much to establish our reputation as a leading authority in the field of vernacular architecture.
