Walk around South Halifax

Saturday 9 June 2012

Meet at Shears Inn car park, Paris Gates, Halifax at 2pm for a three-hour walk with Stuart Crowther looking at the development of south Halifax including vernacular buildings and industrial sites. Photographing Historic Buildings

Saturday 23 June 2012

Would you like to take better photographs of buildings? Join English Heritage photographer Alun Bull for this training day in York designed to help us improve our photography skills. We hope to include a practical outdoor session on photographing buildings in the morning, followed by an indoor afternoon session on what to do with your photos once you've taken them – such as preparing them for reports or presentations. Visit to the villages of Winewall, near Colne, and Worsthorne, near Burnley

Saturday 21 July 2012

A full day excursion over the county border into East Lancashire led by Kevin Illingworth, starting at 10.30am. In the morning we visit a corn-drying kiln at the back of Winewall House, a seventeenth century farmhouse in the small, little-known, village of Winewall, near Trawden, south-east of Colne. This is a small barn-like structure of c.1700, listed grade II* as an extremely well-preserved example of a rare building type. Access to the small fire-chamber under the grill of stone joists and stone slats (like a cellar). Courtesy of Stanley Payne. Visit also includes a Winewall walkabout viewing several interesting seventeenth century houses, wells, vaccary walls, and a cheese-press stone.

Lunch at Red Rock Café – no mods and no rockers, but we pass a well-preserved cast iron urinal on the way!

In the afternoon we visit Jackson's Farm, Worsthorne, near Burnley (grade II*). Courtesy of Mrs Jean Witt. Farmhouse of 1627 with earlier cross-wing of c.1600. Jettied porch leads to narrow end through-passage, a plan peculiar in the Pennines to the Burnley and Colne areas. Wing has arched lights and internally a timber-framed partition wall and heavy ceiling beams resting on large moulded stone

corbels. Housepart has remains of elaborate plasterwork. Former smoke-hood arched over through-passage as at Everhillshaw, Heptonstall. Here a large ceiling beam is trying to do the twist! Outside is cheese-press stone and base, and stone roller. Tea/coffee/biscuits here. This part (Jackson's Farm) costs £5; the rest of the day is free of charge.

A Worsthorne walkabout follows, including Wallstreams (two ogee-headed windows). Some white-painted pointing in village, a local tradition. Also The Red Man.

Meet 10.30am at Winewall, near Trawden. Directions: Immediately east of Colne is a roundabout on the Keighley to Colne road (A6068). From here (Keighley Road) take the B6250 (Cotton Tree Lane) to Trawden, downhill in a south-easterly direction. After half a mile LBS Garden Centre will be seen on the left. Turn left after LBS into Winewall Road, then turn left again into the *public* car park, before Winewall Bridge and Cotton Tree Inn.

Visit to Lawkland Hall and Clapham village, north Craven

Sunday 5 August 2012

A visit arranged by Kevin Illingworth which will include the following highlights:

10.30am. Clapham village (or a bit further) walkabout.

12.30pm. Lunch at The Old Manor House (listed grade II, 1701). Sandwiches and meals cost £3.50 to £5.50. The house has a two-storey porch with decorated lintel (1701) and triangular gable dovecote. Decorative hoodmould stops. Massive external stack. Having lunch here enables us to inspect the enormous segmental arched fireplace with joggled voussoirs, decorated keystone (1701) and two bread ovens.

1.45pm. Drive three miles to Lawkland Hall, Lawkland (grade I). Guided tour by Giles Bowring, the owner. House has hall range with crosswings, dating from the late sixteenth century and 1679, with much early twentieth century restoration. Features include priest-hole and tall stair-turret with spiral staircase, and belvedere at the top. Cheese-press stone outside.

Followed by a short walk to Bank Barn, a large seventeenth century barn (grade II), extended in 1763, with three re-used mullion windows (and transoms) in the gable end above the three-door shippon.

Finally, a pleasant walk through part of the 550 acre estate to a bank barn.

Lawkland Hall tour costs £5, all to charity, and there is a limit of 25 people. Lawkland Hall was recorded by YVBSG in 1985 (report number 1032). Search <http://list.english-heritage.org.uk> or www.imagesofengland.org.uk for further details.

Meet 10.30am outside The Old Manor House (Reading Room Café), Clapham, six miles north-west of Settle). Parking: YDNPA car park £4 for more than two hours; however there is free parking on Church Avenue alongside the river (Clapham Beck) as far as St James Church, especially for early birds.

Research into galleting – an update

Over the winter of 2011-2012 requests were sent out asking for details, locations and photographs of properties with galleted joints as part of research being carried out at Anglia Ruskin University. Thanks to the interest of groups such as the YVBSG, responses have been received from as far north as the Orkneys and as far south as Guernsey. Everyone who has participated should have received a response; please let me know if this is not the case or if you would like to learn more. The information has helped to build an invaluable resource for the study of the geographical spread and development of galleting throughout the UK.

Detailed photographs are particularly useful for comparing different joints and understanding regional variations in these. We were not disappointed with the quantity or quality of the pictures received. However according to the information available about historical buildings in the Yorkshire area and counties to the north of the region there should be many examples of some interest to us but unfortunately we are desperately short of close-up pictures to

support this. Perceptions of galleting vary considerably from one area to another and for this reason it can be difficult to identify but we are very happy to receive any pictures that show smaller pieces of stone, brick, glass, indeed any material that is incorporated into the masonry joints of a wall. Some examples of jointing can be viewed on my website at www.galleting.com.

If you are out and about with your camera and spot a wall that might be of interest please do not hesitate to take a photograph and send it to me at the email address below. As I said last time, any information, no matter how small, is much appreciated as every piece adds to the overall picture. Once again thanks from me and the rest of the team at Anglia Ruskin University to all who have contributed to this valuable work.
