A comparative study of settlement, architecture, communications and industry within the Pennine region bounded by Burnley, Halifax and Rochdale, which is divided into three areas by the valleys of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Calders and the River Roche.

The main linking thread will be the buildings starting from the later 14th century to the early 19th century, These will include manor houses, farms, merchants' houses, cottages, and industrial buildings. Primary Aims?

Taken from the Newsletter of the Institute of Field Archaeologists Buildings Special Interest Group, Spring 1996

A conference held in York on 16 February 1996 considering stratigraphic approaches to the study of standing buildings came up with the following:

The primary aims of an analytical survey of an historic building should be:

- To determine and then describe the age and plan of the original structure.
- 2. To record the sequence of additions and alterations.
- To understand the function of the building and its individual portions and see how these may have changed over time.
- 4. To investigate the relevant documentary history.
- To put the information gained from points 1 to 4 into some form of illustrated report, at least one copy of which will be deposited in a public library or archive.

Are we doing all this? Do we agree with it?!
