

For some time now I've wanted a copy of Barry Harrison and Barbara Hutton's Vernacular Houses in North Yorkshire and Cleveland, but the book is getting very difficult to obtain. In fact, one member requested an out-of-print book search last year and was told that she would have to pay £150 for a copy! I was delighted, therefore, when a search over the internet tracked down a copy for sale in a bookshop in San Francisco. The book cost me £24.68 in total - slightly less than the £25 it would have cost new in 1984. So, if you ever spot a copy going for 50p in a car boot sale, snap it up quickly there are other members who would like copies!

But how on earth had my copy got to San Francisco?

Back to school?

A wide variety of courses on subjects related to vernacular architecture are offered by the Worker's Education Association (WEA), local universities, colleges and museums. Occasional day/weekend courses are available as well.

If the idea of a trip out of Yorkshire appeals, you might like to try one of the Field Studies Council courses which are held at various centres throughout Britain (tel 01743 850674 for a brochure). This year's courses included Suffolk's Medieval Houses, A Weekend on Watermills and Windmills, and Historic Townscapes. I tried a five-day course on Suffolk and Essex Villages and found it a good introduction to a region I didn't know very well.

YVBSG joins PLACE

The YVBSG recently became a Partner Organisation of PLACE – a regional centre for research on *People, Landscape And Cultural Environment*, based at the College of York and Ripon St John, in York PLACE's mission is "to promote and coordinate research on the People, Landscape and Cultural Environment of northern Yorkshire." Its aims are:

- to provide a focal point within northern Yorkshire for research on the region
- to raise the profile of existing research work on northern Yorkshire's changing landscape, culture and people
- to attract funding for research, scholarship and consultancy work
- to extend contacts and connections with both academic institutions and the wider community within the region
- to form partnerships with appropriate organisations, such as countryside agencies and archaeological/historical groups

Other Partner Organisations, of which there are about twenty, include English Heritage, the North York Moors and Dales National Parks, the RCHME, Ryedale Folk Museum and York Archaeological Trust.

We will be contributing to the PLACE annual conference in October (see opposite page) by mounting a poster display on our work. We also intend to take part in the excursion and will focus on how village vernacular buildings near York are being affected by urban encroachment.

PLACE's Millennium Project is to produce a Historical Atlas of North Yorkshire. Their editorial group is looking for suggestions for topics for inclusion in the atlas and for volunteers to produce text/maps on these topics. The YVBSG has expressed an interest in making a contribution. If you have any ideas for topics or would like to be involved, please contact David Cant as soon as possible.
