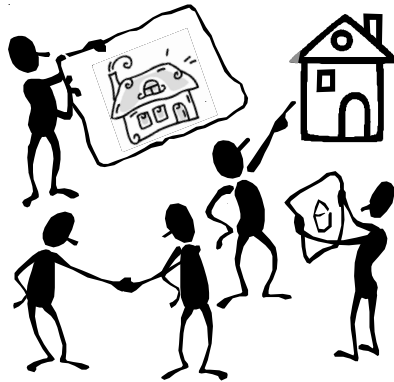

Some current work in Richmond

At the beginning of October we started the recording work for a block of houses at Anchor Hill in Richmond. I was joined by three members of the Swaledale and Arkengarthdale Vernacular Buildings Study Group which was formed in 2007 (see www.swaledalemuseum.org/vernacular.html). We were a little short handed so we were only able to look at one house. There are another four to look at and at the moment I am in the process of organising the next visit. The house we did look at was interesting. It had got into a terrible state before the current owners took it over. The roof had to be rebuilt but as part of the rebuild the owners kept pieces of the single original truss in place. There is also an original stair turret at the back of the house. The Swaledale group members did a good job recording the ground floor plan plus various bits and pieces. One of the other buildings, to be recorded, has got some relocated crucks which might be of interest to people.

The YVBSG has been out and about recently, with publicity displays at various events including the York Archaeology and History Book fair on 10 October, the 'New Research into the History of Yorkshire' conference on 7 November, and the West Yorkshire Archaeology Advisory Service Annual Day School on 14 November.

What went on at recent YVBSG events ...

Conference Review Day

A well-attended Conference Review Day took place in Carlton-in-Coverdale on Sunday 27 September 2009. In the morning, presentations on the buildings recorded earlier in the year highlighted some unique or unusual features, such as a particularly well-preserved dairy at The Moorcock, nicely fitted out with stone shelves and wooden ventilation slats. Some features common to several buildings were noted, for example wide stone staircases with a rounded bottom step. The presentations were followed by a walk round the village in the afternoon, with the opportunity to visit some of the buildings and see in situ the features discussed, including round chimney stacks and spiral kneelers. Thanks go to the householders and to David Cook, Isobel Jenkins, Elaine Joynes and everyone else involved in making the arrangements.



Long Preston Vernacular Buildings Training Day

On Saturday 17 October 2009 several members got together with the Long Preston Heritage Project for a study day on vernacular buildings, which followed a similar format to the day held in April at East Keswick. In the morning, a talk by Alison Armstrong on why and how we record vernacular buildings was followed by a local history overview of Long Preston by Tony Stephens. Kath Lord then described the recent conversion of a village barn into a desirable dwelling. Once again, Bob Greaves' models of timber trusses and joints were on display and much admired. The afternoon saw a guided tour looking at village buildings, with a close inspection

of Maypole Barn and the opportunity to observe (and take part in) the recording of the barn. Participants reported later that they were amazed at what they could learn in a barn! We hope to maintain the relationship with Long Preston and carry out more recording in the village in the future.

Buildings and the Building Process in Guisborough before the Industrial Age



Members were offered a fascinating insight into the buildings of Guisborough on Sunday 18 October 2009, when Barry Harrison, Jacky Quarmby and Joyce Williams led a guided walk round the town. Their



extensive research has enabled them to trace the history of the original plots and of the buildings located on them, and we spent several enjoyable hours exploring these plots and wandering around the paths and back lanes of the town to catch glimpses of the backs of the buildings. We thank Barry, Jacky and Joyce, and also Roger Darnton, curator of Guisborough Museum, who contributed much useful information on the day.

We were joined in Guisborough by a journalist who intends to write an article for *The Dalesman* about the YVBSG. The publication date is not yet known but you might like to look out for it in the coming months!

Recent books

Yorkshire West Riding: Leeds, Bradford and the North by Peter Leach and Nikolaus Pevsner. Pevsner Architectural Guides/Buildings of England, October 2009. This volume, the first of two for the area, covers the northern half of the West Riding from the outskirts of York to the edge of the Lake District. It is full of contrasts, from the urbanised landscape of Leeds and Bradford to their hinterland of mill-towns and villages pushing into the Pennines. There can be found the highly distinctive houses of the seventeenth-century minor gentry, and the substantial yeoman farmers and clothiers. To the north-west are the Yorkshire Dales; to the east are Fountains Abbey and Studley Royal, Ripon and Harrogate, and the agricultural 'broad acres' beyond. Normal price £29.99.

Also published this year is *Lancashire: North* by Clare Hartwell. Pevsner Architectural Guides/Buildings of England, February 2009. The landscapes range from Morecambe Bay and the Forest of Bowland in the north to the coastal flatlands and Pennine mill towns in the south, and to Lancaster with its fine Georgian buildings. Normal price £29.99.

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
